#### 1. Course Description

This course presents an introduction to fundamental concepts in deductive logic, probabilistic reasoning, and rational decision making. Students will learn to identify the logical structure of everyday arguments and pieces of reasoning and will learn tools that can be used to formally evaluate when argument structures are or are not valid.

Readings for the course will be taken from "Elements of Deductive Inference" by Joseph Bessie and Stuart Glennan and from "An Introduction to Probability and Inductive Logic" by Ian Hacking. The relevant selections from both texts will be made available through the sakai site for the course, though students are also welcome to purchase the texts if they so choose.

Graded assignments for this course will consist of a midterm exam, a final exam, and bi-weekly homework assignments. The final for the course is not cumulative.
